Drawing Near to God

Pastor Troy Taylor's message for Sunday morning on the 15th of September was taken from the Book of Exodus, chapter 20 and verses 18 through 21. This portion of Scripture is telling us of when the glory of God came down and God was going to communicate with His people. This was the time that God was going to give his people directions, commandments, and instructions on how to go forward into His work and to be the people of God. But because there was a very

strong atmosphere of the presence of God there was thunderings, lightings, noise and smoke and this frightened the people.

As a result of their fearfulness the people collectively told Moses; you go draw close to God but we're going to stay back her. Two Offerings

After Adam and Eve had disobeyed and eaten of the forbidden fruit, God sent them away from the Garden of Eden forever. He even sent angels to guard the Tree of Life and to keep them from retuning to their first home. Surely Adam and Eve were not as happy away from their home, but one day something wonderful did happen to them — they had a little baby boy. They named him Cain; and later when they had another little boy, they called him Abel. These first babies must have looked beautiful to their mother and father, just as new babies do to us today.

As they were growing up, Cain and Abel were interested in different things. Cain liked to farm and watch things growing in the ground. Abel liked best to be around the animals and to look after the sheep of his father kept.

In these early times, people did not worship God by going to church. Instead, they brought something that they had for the Lord and burned it. The offering was called a *sacrifice*, and usually it was

burned on a rock or some stones called an *altar*.

One day Cain and Abel brought sacrifices to the Lord. Cain brought some of the fruits and vegetables that he had grown in his garden. Abel brought some of the finest sheep from his flocks. We do not understand exactly why, but God was not pleased with the offering that Can made, while He thought that Abel's was good. This made Cain very angry, and the Bible tells us that it even showed on his face how displeased he was.

God spoke to Cain and asked him not to look so angry. He told Cain that He would give him another chance to do right and that he could be as pleasing as Abel was. But Cain kept brooding about the way that God had not accepted his offering instead of trying to change and do right. Not only was he angry with God, but he began to blame his brother as well. One day when they were out in a field together, Cain got so upset about it that he killed Abel.

Of course the Lord knew

about this terrible thing that Cain had done, but just to test Cain, He asked him where Abel was. Cain puffed up in anger and tried to cover his sin by asking, "Ami I my brother's keeper?"

God put a special mark on Cain so that the strangers whom he met as he wandered about would not harm him. God always loves us even when we do wrong, but He has to punish us to help us remember to obey.

people or the collective mindset of the people can be very dangerous. Therefore with this in mind Pastor Taylor titled his message "Drawing Near to God, Drawing Near to the Lord."

Even in services where God is moving you can't let people hold you back because not everybody is going where we're going. But if you let people they will discourage you from going all the way by making light of it and/or question the necessity of it all. The Scriptures have a lot of references to the power of the people. One reference is where the people of God conveniently forgot that they were slaves and their backs were beaten and bloodied and they collectively cried out to Moses 'let's go back to Egypt because we had it better there.' Then there was Joshua and Caleb where the people collectively said 'let's stone them' because they said we can take the land for it is ours. Even when Moses came back from being in the presence of the Lord at the burning bush and said God is going to deliver us but after a few plagues came and Pharaoh

still did not let God's people go, they wanted to stone Mo-

People don't always think right and you can't always go with the crowd because crowd thinking can mess you up and lead you in the wrong direction. If you listen to the crowd you're going to get yourself into big trouble. You have to have a mind and spirit of your own and you can't go the way of the crowd. You can't listen to what the people say because if you listen to the people you can't listen to God at the same time. The people don't always line up with the Lord.

If we're going to follow Jesus we're going to have to be willing to go alone sometime because everybody's not going to want what we want. Living for God can be a lonely thing sometimes. But you know what? You and God make up a majority. Don't worry about being alone or who don't follow you or doesn't go.

The Bible is a hard, narrow book and it's not for everybody because everybody doesn't want to walk the narrow way. Reason being is that

they're content with the crowds and the people, blending in and bending to be just like everybody else. Well for your information, the Lord didn't call us or His Church to be like everyone else. So we need to resist the pressure to conform to and go the way of this world. Because we are not of this world but we're a sanctified, set apart, holy people for God and we're going the narrow way. It's a straight way, it's a hard way but it's the right way, the good way and it is the best way.

Everybody's not going to do this or line up. You got to be willing to go it alone sometimes and be able to stand your ground. The way of the people is to worship false gods and bow down to idols and to go the way of the world. But we're not going the way of the people, we're going the way of the holy people, we're on the King's highway. It may be a lonely place, it may be isolated, you may be a different person but that's OK to be different for Jesus and not to go the way of the crowd.

The meaning of the root word "holy" means to be separated or withdrawn from that which is common or unclean. and consecrated to what is sacred and pure. God alone is pure and holy. He is perfect; man is imperfect. God is divine; man is human. He is morally perfect; man is sinful. God abhors that which is evil. It is easy to understand that He cannot tolerate sin of any kind. To Him it is vile and detestable. Therefore, it is evident that man must become holy in order to attain fellowship with God.

Holiness is a condition of the heart. It is a sum total of our attitudes and consecrations toward God. Therefore we must take heed of our attitudes and motives as we strive to be holy. We must manifest Christ-like attitudes.

Jesus said, "Blessed are the pure in heart. . . . " Are our hearts really pure? Are our motives pure? Why do we do the things we do? What motivates us? Are our talents separated and dedicated to the service of God? Can He really use us?

Only those who are holy and sanctified shall be able to see Jesus and enter His kingdom. On that day, He will present to himself a Church, ". . . a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish." (Ephesians 5:27)

To sanctify means to separate from evil and dedicate exclusively to the service of God. Man's part is to bring himself to the sanctifying influence of the Holy Ghost and allow God to work His will. Sinful man is wholly incapable of making himself holy. This is the work of the Holy One.

There is nothing man can do to merit sanctification. All

his righteousness would be as filthy rags. But thank God, we have a Holy One who is happy to sanctify and cleanse us!

The process of sanctification begins the moment a person hears or reads the gospel message, for the Word of God has a cleansing influence in the heart of the hearer. "Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you." (John "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word truth." (John 17:17) There is a definite power in God's Word to convict sinners of their sins and reveal to them their need of a close walk with god, a sanctification, and deeper consecration.

It is the responsibility of every God-fearing child of God to see to it that he keeps himself under the influence of the sanctifying power of God by repentance, surrender of his will to God's will, consecration, dedication, complete separation from the world, faith, and obedience.

None of us was born perfect. The very fact that Peter exhorted the saints to " . . . grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord. . . ," proves to us that sanctification is a progressive process in our lives. (2 Peter 3:18) The Christian who is filled with the Spirit, walks after the Spirit, and is led by the Spirit will live a holy life, one that is dedicated and consecrated to the will of God. he will live a life above sin, and will feel no condemnation.

There are many advantages and rewards of holy living. The Christian enjoys greater peace of mind and heart. He enjoys happiness. His life is more fruitful and satisfying, for he lives a life of service to God and others.

Are there any secrets to successful holy living? In-

deed, there are! Following are only a few:

Allow the power of the Holy Ghost to change you and teach you.

Learn to communicate daily with God. It is of vital necessity that you talk to your "Creator." It is through Him that we move and have our being. A prayerful life is a happy and victorious life.

Realize that only after you relinquish your will to *God's* will will you know peace. find the mind of God

Read the Bible daily. Let it "come alive" to your heart. Attend Bible studies and participate. Get involved with your studies. Think about the lesson. Ask questions that will clarify doctrines.

Dedicate yourself fully to His service and to His will for your life. Don't get side-tracked! Keep God as top priority on your list and you can stay happy.

Live each day one day at a time. Live "in-depth." Don't become stale. You can go on learning and keep alive all your life!

Keep your eyes off the faults of others. Look to Jesus as the one who has an answer to every problem you might encounter.

Witness to others of the power and the hope that lies within you. You will be blessed and feel victorious when you witness boldly of the power of God.





God is Closer than you think

The intellectual Spiritual Pathway People on the intellectual pathway draw closer to God as they learn more about him. You begin to vibrate when someone talks about the "live of the mind." ... You love to study Scripture... The road to your heart usually runs through your head... The danger of this pathway lies in becoming all head and not heart... It is extremely difficult to be right and not hurt anybody with it... So you may want to stretch by making sure your growth knowledge always leads to a growth in worship.



The title "Exodus" is an anglicized version of a Greek word that means "departure" in recognition of one of the book's major events—the departure of God's people from Egypt. Exodus could be considered the central book of the Old Testament because it records God's act of saving the Israelites and establishing them as a covenant communitv. a nation chosen to serve and represent Him. Exodus describes the enslavement and oppression of the Israelites: the preparation and call of Moses; the conflict between Jehovah the God of Israel and gods of Egypt (represented by Pharaoh); the exodus of the Israelites; their establishment as a nation in covenant with the Lord; their rebellion; and the Lord's provision for their ongoing relationship, symbolized by His presence at the tabernacle that the built for Him.

The book of Exodus does not state who its author was. It does refer to occasions when Moses made a written record of events that took place and what God had said (Exo. 17:14; 24:4, 7; 34:27-28). The book also contains references to preserving and passing on information. Along with the other four books of the Pentateuch, it has long been considered the work of Moses. Moses could have written Exodus at any time during a 40-year time span: after the Israelites finished constructing and dedicating the tabernacle at mount Sinai, at the start of their second year after leaving Egypt (1445 B.C.), and before his death in the land of Moab (about 1406 B.C.).

Exodus picks up where the Genesis narrative ended with

the death of Joseph around 1805 B.C. It quickly moves us forward almost 300 years to a time when the circumstances of Jacob's descendants had changed in Egypt. The Israelites were serving as slaves during Egypt's Eighteenth Dynasty, probably under the pharaohs Thutmose Amenhotep II. The Hebrew slaves experienced a miraculous deliverance from slavery by God's hand through His servant-leader Moses in 1445 B.C. The book of Exodus records the events surrounding the exodus from Egypt and the Israelites' first year in the wilderness, including the giving of the law.

The date of the exodus is disputed, but biblical evidence favors 1446 B.C. First Kings 6:1 states that the exodus occurred 480 years before Solomon's fourth year as king, established by biblical data combined with Assyrian chronology to be 9676 B.C. In Judges 11:26 Jephthah said that Israel had been living in regions of Canaan for 300 years. Jephthah lived around 1100 B.C., thus dating the end of the wilderness journey around 1400 B.C.

The book of Exodus show God at work with the goal of having such close fellowship with people that He is described as dwelling among them. He rescued the Israelites in order to make Himself known, not only by the exercise of His power but also through an ongoing covenant relationship based on His capacity for patience, grace, and forgiveness. The record of what the Lord did for the Israelites provided grounds for them to recognize Him as their God who deserved their complete loyalty and obedience. This record would make clear to the Israelites their identity as God's people and would continue the display of His glorious identity.

Exodus conveys four strong messages:

- 1. The Lord God: God revealed Himself to Moses and Israel as Jehovah (or Yahweh), "I AM THAT I AM." This covenant name for God carries profound meaning and affirms the power, authority, and eternal nature of God.
- 2. Redemption: The Israelites prayed for deliverance and God responded. God worked through His servant-leader Moses, but He did it in such a miraculous way that it was obvious God was at work. The Israelites could not save themselves; it was all the work of God. The Passover was established to serve as an annual reminder of God's work on their behalf.
- 3. Law: The law of God is encapsulated in the Ten Commandments, God's absolutes for spiritual and moral living. the law is divided into two sections: The civil law—the rules that govern life in the community—and the ceremonial law—the patterns for worship and building the tabernacle.
- 4. Tabernacle: God gave specific instructions on how the tabernacle was to be built. but its significance is in what it represented—God dwelling among His people. He was specifically understood to dwell in the most holy place, inaccessible to the normal Israelite. The tabernacle points ahead to the moment when Christ removed the veil of separation, giving all believers access to God. In the NT, believers become the tabernacle, for God doesn't

Whenever the glory of the Lord appears, sinners fear for their lives. There is no shelter for our wretchedness when we confront God's blazing holiness.

In their hiding place among the trees, Adam and Eve hear God call, "Where are you?" The are afraid, but God's call is actually the first sign of his grace. God seeks them. They have not been abandoned. From now on, history will be the story of God seeking and calling while people are running and hiding.

"Where are you?" god has not stopped calling. Not yet. If you hear his voice today, do not delay but come.

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just dwell *among* His people; He dwells *in* them.

Exodus provides the high point of redemptive history in the OT. Many patterns and concepts from Exodus receive attention, further development, and fulfillment elsewhere in Scripture, especially in the past, present, and future work of the Lord Jesus. These include rescue from oppression, provision of sustenance, God's faithfulness to His promises, the self-revelation of God, knowledge of God resulting from His actions, the presence of God, His glory, efforts required to preserve the knowledge of God, a new

identity for people that is based on God's actions, provision for worship, provision for life in community, connection between the reputation of God and His relationship with a group of people, obedience and rebellion, intercession, and gracious forgiveness.

Exodus is considered a part of the Law, but it is more historical narrative than law. The book is structured around the life and travels of Moses. Sandwiched between the narratives of chapters 1-18 and 32-40 are the establishment of the covenant (chaps. 19-24)

and the laws related to the tabernacle and priesthood.

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Chef's Corner

Classic Southern Fried Shrimp

Self-rising flour contains baking powder, which gives a more crisp and crunchy result than all-purpose flour.

Ingredients

1 pound raw medium shrimp

- 1 large egg
- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups self-rising flour
- 1 teaspoon Cajun seasoning
- ½ teaspoon Old Bay Seasoning
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4-1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon lemon pepper


Directions

- 1) Preheat deep fryer or heat oil in a large heavy pot to 350°. Peel and devein shrimp, rinsing well. Pat dry with paper towels.
- 2) Whisk together egg and milk, and add shrimp to mixture.
- 3) In separate bowl, stir flour together with all seasonings. Dip shrimp in flour mixture to coat, then place in colander set over a plate or tray. Toss shrimp in flour mixture a second time, place back in colander, and shake well to remove excess flour.
- 4) Fry in small batches, 3–4 minutes per batch, or until golden brown. Shake fryer basket, and turn out onto a platter lined with paper towels, then sprinkle with just a bit of additional salt.

Batter Fried: Add ½ cup flour along with 2 tablespoons melted and cooled butter, to beaten egg and milk. Dip shrimp in batter, shake off to drain, then roll in seasoned flour before frying.



Our Gifts for His Kingdom

1 Corinthians 12:4-7

- 4 Now there are diversities of gifts, but the same Spirit.
- 5 And there are differences of administrations, but the same Lord.
- 6 And there are diversities of operations, but it is the same od which worketh all in all.
- 7 But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man to profit withal.

Read: 1 Corinthians 12:4-7

Many people hear the word "serve" and feel that they do not have the necessary qualities to make a difference in others' lives. This is true—apart from God. But He has gifted each of us in unique ways with a purpose in mind. His plan for us involves using these talents to serve Him for the good of others.

Satan would like us to believe otherwise. Our enemy wants us to notice what others are doing and then to feel inferior. For instance, I have heard women say, "I am *just* a homemaker." They see people preaching and singing in the choir and wish they could accomplish

something so great for God. Friends, there could be nothing further from the truth. An enormous responsibility rest with those who train their children in righteousness.

In fact, the Holy Spirit has gifted each believer for specific work in God's kingdom. Scripture explains this idea by a comparison with a human body: each person has gifts and purposes that make the entire system function well. But if the heel wants the eye's role, the whole being will lose balance.

Each part is crucial, even though some are less noticeable than others. Truthfully, those with less apparent talents have an advantage because pride and self-sufficiency may be less of a temptation.

Notice how Peter defined himself: "a bond-servant and apostle of Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 1:1). He was no longer a man motivated by self-interest. Once he followed Jesus, he saw himself as a servant of God. We, too, are called to serve the King of Kings with whatever abilities we are given.
